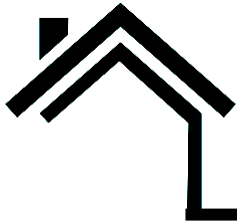

SUBJECT: 2022 ESG BoS Project Application Recommendation

Background

A total of six 2022 ESG Balance of State (BoS) applications were received, four of those were received by the July 27, 5pm deadline and one did not meet the requirements. Of the applications reviewed by the Review and Ranking Committee, two were submitted for the Regional Competition, and one for Non-Competitive Rapid Re-Housing.

Upon initial receipt, all four applications were reviewed to ensure the minimum application requirements were met. The following projects were then submitted to the Review and Ranking Committee:

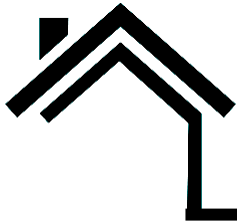
On Thursday, August 4, the ESG Review and Ranking Committee reviewed and scored the qualifying applications. The Committee consisted of Keesha Hills, Briana Harvey-Butterfield, Marie Demers, MaryJo Alonzo, and Debbie Villasenor. Scoring was based on the rating criteria outlined by HCD for the Regional Competition detailed in the ESG Notice of Funding Availability dated June 13, 2022.

The ESG Review and Ranking Committee recommends the following applications be submitted to HCD:

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Emergency Solutions Grant Balance of State (BoS) Project Details

BoS Regional Competition Applications:

Catalyst Domestic Violence Services is requesting \$200,000 to serve families and individuals fleeing domestic violence and in need of safe, confidential emergency shelter. With these funds, Catalyst would hire an additional dedicated FTE Advocate to help meet this increase and free our Children's Advocates to focus with households with children. We would also include minimal hours for our Children's Advocate to assist with any additional children in shelter. Services provided by the Advocate would be direct services in the form of shelter assessment and welcoming process, crisis intervention and support, resource and referral, emergency transportation; advocate and collaborate with community service providers for participant needs and one-on-one advocacy (aka case management services). The Children's Advocate would to provide services to children/youth/families in the housing programs including but not limited to, immediate assistance with behavioral and emotional needs; facilitate group and/or individual therapeutic, recreational and educational activities; provide and/or coordinate supervision of children during parent's appointments and groups related to parents' goals; provide and/or coordinate childcare for respite time for parent among other supports.

The Oroville Rescue Mission (ORM) is submitting a competitive application for emergency shelter funding under the Emergency Solutions Grant Balance of State regional competition. The Oroville Rescue Mission plans to utilize the funding primarily to support emergency shelter essential services, plus a small budget for shelter operations and indirect costs. The ORM hopes to serve 90 unduplicated individuals through the 24-month contract term of ESG funds. The ORM will not be targeting specific subpopulations and retains shelter beds in a men's dorm, a women's dorm, and a family dorm.

The ORM has typically been a privately funded organization meeting the growing needs of the City of Oroville and southern Butte County, but as the operation and need grows, so must the resources. The ORM was once awarded HEAP funding through the CoC but remains primarily donation driven for its operations.

BoS Non-Competitive Rapid Re-Housing Applications:

CHAT is seeking \$161,001 in Rapid Rehousing (RRH) funding for a new program that will provide permanent housing navigation services those that are ready to move into permanent housing. Previously, CHAT has focused on providing permanent supportive housing through the Housing Now program, which continues to expand and provide individuals and families with housing and case management. Having the Housing Navigation program will help CHAT to be able to connect individuals to permanent housing outside of CHAT as the need for permanent housing is ever-growing. In addition, the Housing Navigation program will include a landlord incentive program, providing landlords with first month's rent, as well as covering application fees.
